Starlink - Janine Friedrich

Janine has sent an email to Starlink asking if they would consider assisting with the costs of installing Starlink infrastructure and the ongoing connection costs for MidCoast Community halls. No acknowledgement of email has been received. There are no other ways of contacting Starlink

The group discussed ways to improve telecommunications access:

- Council/government subsidy for individuals purchasing their own satellite phone. Who could the group lobby for this kind of subsidy to be set up?
- How do we get funding for alternative telecommunications technology in our communities, e.g. UHF radio, satellite phone and Starlink. Can we approach philanthropists
- Inviting our Federal Member for Lyme, Dr David Gillespie to come to a meeting to hear our concerns about telecommunications
- What specific technologies would ensure our communities have more resilient telecommunications?
- Communities need to take some onus and apply for grants themselves.
- Regional Tech Hub provides independent, free advice about telecommunications services for regional, rural, and remote Australians, including connectivity options for individual households and advocating with telcos when services are not delivered/resolved. More information

- Manning Point road (Oxley Island to Manning Point),
- Main street (Manning Point)
- Old Bar Rd (Tavern to ambulance station)
- Harrington Rd
- Lansdowne Rd
- Upper Lansdowne Rd

From Daniel Park, Manager Operations North

"Under the NSW Disaster Assistance Guidelines (DAG), the NSW Government provides financial assistance to councils to restore essential public assets that are damaged as a <u>direct result</u> of an eligible disaster. You will find that those roads listed below have not been directly affected by the disaster. Their pre-disaster pavement condition was already considered "poor". Therefore, they are not eligible for funding under these arrangements.

Having said that and not sure if you're aware but Council has set aside \$7.5M for additional road repair works that are targeting roads such as Lansdowne Road and Upper Lansdowne Road with works to be delivered this financial year. Further details can be found at the following link: \$7.5 million roads program | Have Your Say (nsw.gov.au)"

The Harrington Road project was not a natural disaster funded project. This project is now completed.
