1	Welcome Acknowledgement of Country
2	Previous notes and action list. Lyndie Hepple provided an update on the action list.
3	Apologies received from Crs Smith and Stinson were noted. Paul De Szell chaired the meeting in their absence. Apologies were also received from Arthur Chapman prior to the meeting.
4	Presentation: Disability Inclusion Action Plan (DIAP).
	Lyndie Hepple presented on Council's progress in delivering year one actions and outcomes for the Disability Inclusion Action Plan.
	Paul de Szell advised that Council has recently adopted a new policy (Reasonable Adjustments Policy) which provides for adjustments to workplaces and practices to accommodate the needs of people with disability.
	A copy of the presentation is included with these notes. Note that the picture of accessible viewing platform at Diamond Beach is incomplete and will be completed shortly.
5	Presentation from Manning Suicide Prevention Network. Mydie Keegan delivered a presentation on the work of the Manning Suicide Prevention Network. A copy of the presentation is included with these notes.

6 Any other business

Home in Place reported that there has been a good response to fire at Ronald Road on 30 March – managed to place people into temporary accommodation. Six dwellings were completely lost but all 18 were affected.

Felicity Carter reported that the women's shelter has been seeking transitional housing for women moving out of the new 10-bedroom shelter. A local philanthropic family is purchasing a property which will provide 6 units for women.

Forster Neighbourhood Centre has moved into its new location at the former Bottle Shop next to the Lakes and Ocean Hotel.

A memorandum of understanding has been signed between Home in Place, Mission Australia and Community Housing Limited for community development activities in this area. The MOU will ensure the three providers collaborate on projects in the three major social housing areas – initially community greening, waste control, assisting tenants with waste control, etc.

Home in Place was asked whether there is any engagement with First Steps Count. Tim Larritt advised that the Bushlands Estate Action Group (BEAT) meets fortnightly to manage anti-social behaviour in partnership with the Police and PCYC to make improvements in the estate for all residents, eg trying to engage with young people, introduce more youth programs, support for residents (parenting programs etc). First Steps Count has engaged with the group, but the relationship is in its infancy.

Follow up from 6 February:

Alex Mills advised that following Leonie McGuire's presentation on partnerships with the Police, the State Government has committed to funding for social workers to be embedded in police stations and first response locations. Interested local area commands must express an interest in order to receive the funding. Paul de Szell advised he had an upcoming meeting with Chris Schilt and would make him aware of the update.

FOCUS AREA 1-

POSITIVE COMMUNITY ATTITUDES AND BEHAVIOURS





PEOPLE LIVING WITH A DISABILITY ON THE MIDCOAST ARE RECOGNISED AND VALUED

- Celebrations for International Day of People with Disability 2022 occurred in partnership with Dundaloo Support Services and Manning Regional Art Gallery
- Over 150 artworks from people with disability were submitted and are still on display at the Gallery
- Exhibition opening happened on IDPwD 2022



COMMUNITY EVENTS SPONSORED BY COUNCIL ARE INCLUSIVE AND ACCESSIBLE

- The MEC has commenced its 'Upgraded accessibility to improve inclusion for all MEC patrons' project funded the NSW Govt Creative Capital fund.
- The project aims to install external footpaths to the Flett Studio, automatic doors for the MEC Foyer, hand rails and quite room in the main auditorium, plus wheel chair lift to the stage.





FOOTPATH SAFETY AND CONNECTIVITY

- 11 applications have been submitted for path improvement projects identified in the PAMP
- 5 shared projects have been funded and in the design/construction phase



OPPORTUNITIES FOR ACTIVE TRANSPORT ARE IMPROVED AND PROMOTED

 Improvements in the active transport network raised through 'Community Conversations' and work requests are monitored to identify community supported projects

ENSURE ADEQUATE ACCESSIBLE PARKING BAY PROVISION

- Ongoing surveys conducted to inform the adequate provision for accessible parking bays
- All project briefs for new works ensure these are compliant with standards and guidelines where they apply





COUNCIL AMENITIES MEET THE NEEDS OF PEOPLE WITH DISABILITY

- Tuncurry Fazio Park amenities currently under construction these will include an adult change table within the facility
- Provision of accessible linkages from point of entry to amenities provided at Tea Gardens Providence Park, Taree MEC Building Extension, Tuncurry John Wright Park and Bulahdelah Lions Park
- Tea Gardens Pool upgrade complete the pool now includes a new ramp, wider pathways, a wider entrance to change areas and an all-access bathroom
- Upgrades to Wingham Library include an accessible toilet and a passenger lift for access to the upstairs meeting rooms





COUNCIL'S RECREATIONAL SPACES MEET THE NEEDS OF PEOPLE WITH DISABILITY

- Playgrounds across the MidCoast have received upgraded equipment, improving access for all
 - John Debert Park, Smiths Lake
 - Marjorie Debert Park, Forster
 - Lansdowne Recreating Reserve
 - King George V Park, Gloucester
 - Forster Main Beach Masterplan is due to be updated in the 2023/24 financial year and MCC has committed to including Wheelchair beach access to this plan
 - The new viewing platform off Jubilee Parade in Diamond Beach has been designed to support all inclusion access from carpark, pathway, ramp to viewing platform.







LOCAL RESIDENTS AND VISITORS CAN EASILY FIND INFORMATION ABOUT ACCESSIBLE ACCOMMODATION AND EXPERIENCES ON THE MIDCOAST

- The Barrington Coast website has 'Accessible Accommodation' as a subcategory in the directory
- A new blog post by Barrington Coast outlines 'Lookouts you can drive up to'
- Awaiting a new blog story by multiaward winning Diane Denton (from Seafarers Diamond Beach) about accessible holidays in the Barrington Coast; Still require further blogs about accessible experiences.





MIDCOAST COUNCIL IS AN ACCESSIBLE AND INCLUSIVE PLACE OF WORK AND PEOPLE WITH A DISABILITY FEEL SAFE AND COMFORTABLE WORKING HERE

- MidCoast Council engaged the Australia Network on Disability (AND) to complete a Recruitment Review – a report from this review was provided in October 2022
 - This review involved AND undertaking assessments of Council's recruitment policies and procedures, including interviews with hiring managers and reviewing Council's job advertisements
- An Action Plan has been developed in accordance with the recommendations provided by the Australian Network on Disability. Many of the recommendations have been actioned. Council will continue to implement the remaining actions through 2023.



PEOPLE WITH A DISABILITY ARE INCLUDED ON COUNCIL INTERVIEW PANELS

 Council is currently updating our online employee database to allow accurate reporting of diversity information – this will make it more efficient to identify employees with disability at MCC and potentially invite them to be on interview panels

LIAISE WITH CHAMBERS OF COMMERCE TO RAISE AWARENESS OF THE BENEFITS OF EMPLOYING PEOPLE WITH DISABILITY

- Dundaloo Support Services regularly presents at Forster Tuncurry Business
 Chamber and Team Taree Functions Council has worked with Dundaloo through
 this to help create local partnerships between them and local businesses
 - Dundaloo now provide cakes and slices to The Junction Café, located at Yalawanyi Ganya



FOCUS AREA 4 – BETTER SYSTEMS AND PROCESSES



COUNCIL STAFF ARE AWARE OF THE NEEDS OF PEOPLE DISABILITY

- Disability Inclusion awareness training will be included in Council's scheduled Corporate Induction Training Plan
- Council's Training and Development Team is in the process of trialling and uploading a Disability Awareness Module into Council's digital onboarding platform

PEOPLE LIVING WITH DISABILITY ARE INCLUDED IN ENGAGEMENT ACTIVITIES AND THEIR IDEAS ARE CONSIDERED IN THE DEVELOPMENT OF PLANS FOR SERVICES, FACILITIES AND ACTIVITIES

- Council's reviewed Community Engagement strategy has been adopted
- All Community Relations team members joining the Engagement, Communication and Education (ECE) department are put through IAP2 Certification – this is ongoing
- The ECE department are in the process of investigating Accessibility training for the digital team

- Original focus to raise awareness and encourage community participation.
- First strategic plan finalised in 2020 with three main objectives:
 - 1. Advocate for Headspace in Taree
 - 2. Provide education and training.
 - 3. Knowing who is who.
- Auspiced by Manning Valley Neighbourhood Service support, sponsorship and guidance.
- Annual signature event of Speed Networking first held in 2021.

Why We Do It

Taree-Gloucester region lost 48 people to suicide (registered) between 2017 and 2021.

Suicide is the second leading cause of death for Australian men.

The highest proportion of deaths by suicide occur in people aged 30-59

Since 2008, the highest rate of suicide is among males 40-49 and over 85's.

Low education can increase risk of suicide by 2.6 times.

 - Wingham
- Support or revive exiting programs
