Meeting items

Opening Cr Roberts welcomed the group, acknowledged the Traditional Owners and invited group members to introduce themselves and their interests.	Cr. Roberts
Role of the Reference Group Gerard Tuckerman gave an outline of the Terms of Reference provided in the committee folder.	Gerard Tuckerman

- Gerard presented a spectrum of stakeholder engagement prepared by the International Association for Public Participation spectrum, and affirmed that the reference group will operate in the mid-range covering involvement and collaboration.
- MCC will work directly with the Group throughout the process to ensure that public concerns and aspirations are consistently understood and considered, and provide feedback on how public input influenced the decision.

Overview of Coastal Management Act

Prue Tucker gave an overview of the Coastal Management Act 2016.

- The Act prioritises protection of four management zones: Wetlands and Littoral Rainforest; Coastal Vulnerability; Coastal Environment Areas and Coastal Use Areas.
- Preparation of the CMP involves 5 stages from scoping and risk assessment to identifying and evaluating options, exhibition, adoption and implementation.
- Once adopted the CMP will be incorporated into Councils IP&R Framework.
- The community will be engaged throughout the planning process.

Questions:

- Ian Crisp asked about the membership of the Technical Working Group (TWG). The TWG is comprised of a range of government agency representatives including DPIE, NPWS, Fisheries, Hunter Local Land Services, Crown Lands and the Water research Lab. Ian noted the absence of industry groups.
- Cr Smith asked if the CMP covers areas of the catchment outside our LGA boundaries? Yes – this is a requirement of the Act. MCC has made contact and will collaborate with the adjacent Councils in the upper catchment: Tamworth, Upper Hunter, and Walcha.

Overview - Manning ECMP Stages 1, 2

Louise Duff gave an overview of the Manning River Estuary CMP progress to date.

- The CMP aims to improve water quality, reduce threats and improve resilience of the manning River Estuary, using a whole-of-catchment approach.
- The CMP commenced with a comprehensive literature review of prior studies and plans.
- The Scoping Study was presented outlining characteristics of the catchment, which covers 8,420 km2 and 16 major subcatchments with 28,803 km of waterways.
- The drought is having significant impact on the catchment and its community.
- Water quality is monitored at 5 sites in the Manning, all sites scored B in the 2019 report card.
- The Manning River Estuary CMP will be completed at the end of 2020 for exhibition in 2021.
